Renowned for his innovative approach, Odunfa frequently employs acrylic on lace and other unconventional materials to create textured masterpieces. His art delves into themes of cultural identity, femininity, and the fusion of tradition with modernity. The minimalist compositions, combined with vibrant colors, invite viewers into a profound visual dialogue. His fascination with the traditional Durbar festival in Northern Nigeria has significantly influenced his depiction of equestrian scenes, symbolizing motion, power, and heritage.

Artist Statement - Ade Odunfa

Art, for me, is a journey through time, texture, and tradition. My work is deeply rooted in Nigeria's rich cultural heritage, infused with contemporary expressions that challenge conventional artistic boundaries. I am drawn to the tactile qualities of vintage textiles, found objects, and unconventional materials—elements that carry history and memory, transformed into visual narratives on my canvas.

My creative process is a dialogue between tradition and innovation. The minimalist compositions I create contrast with the raw, layered textures of my surfaces, allowing each piece to evoke emotion and meaning beyond the visible. The themes in my work are deeply personal yet universally resonant—identity, resilience, community, and cultural continuity.

Equestrian scenes, inspired by my documentation of the Durbar Festival, symbolize motion, power, and heritage, while my sculptural installations reclaim public spaces as canvases for storytelling. As an artist, I believe in the power of mentorship and collaboration. Through my initiative Faces and Phases, I engage with young Nigerian artists, guiding them toward self-expression and professional growth.

My public art projects, including large-scale installations and carnival floats, celebrate the vibrancy of African identity while fostering dialogue between past and present. Now based in Houston, Texas, I continue to explore new mediums, challenging myself to create work that bridges cultures and perspectives. My art is not just a visual experience—it is a living, breathing testament to history, transformation, and the boundless possibilities of creative expression.



Location: Lagos International Airport (decommissioned), Nigeria.

Design: **2020 -** At the New Terminal, Muritala Mohamed International Airport, Ikeja. These are two 70 foot airplane, mounted 20 feet in air, hanging down from the roof of the airport terminal.

Material: Styrofoam and Metal pipe Fame for stability.

Design: **2017 -** Eight 30-foot-tall indigenous life-size wooden canoe made in fiberglass, located along Mobolaji Bank Anthony Way in Ikeja.

Material: Fiberglass





Location: Third Lekki Roundabout, Lagos, Nigeria.

Size: 70 feet long, made from over 120 stainless steel sheets of 4 x 8 feet each.

Material: Stainless steel for durability and resistance to corrosion in the coastal climate.

Material: Metal, wood, Aluminum composite, Net, etc.
